FRUIT TREES FOR THE FUTURE

The beauty of an orchard is obvious, especially in the Spring when the blossom heralds the Summer, and hints at delicious fruit to come. An orchard is also a haven for wildlife, providing shade and extending habitats for birds, mammals and invertebrates.

Orchards help combat climate change by absorbing carbon dioxide, providing delicious produce and enabling us to keep old varieties of apples from being lost. Our orchard fruit will be free for everybody. No need to ask, just pick when ripe and enjoy!

The Town Council has a small fund allocated for tree planting. In October, we bought 40 mixed fruit trees and the Axminster Climate Action Group recruited a fantastic team of orchard volunteers to care for the trees over many years to come.

The 2nd of December 2023 was one of the coldest days of the year but over 20 people, including councillors, council staff and Axminster residents, turned out to plant the newly acquired saplings under the expert guidance of Mike Davis, our Honorary Tree Warden. In a few hours, Axminster had its new community orchard and in three years we will all be able to share in the bounty.

Reducing Carbon & Cutting Costs.

Utilising grant funding from East Devon District Council, we have installed solar panels on the Guildhall to reduce running costs and lower our carbon footprint.

Now, more than ever, escalating energy supply charges mean that the costs of heating and lighting a large building are considerable. This is Tourism Fund to install a commercial solar panel array and battery storage system at the Guildhall. Thankfully, our application was successful and we were awarded £20,000 towards the costs of this exciting project.

Axminster Town Council contributed the balance of around £5,000 from our Eco-Fund (this money was awarded to the town by levies from a solar farm development nearly 10 years ago). The new system was commissioned in Autumn and installed in December of last year.

With this in mind, last year Axminster Town Council took the initiative to apply to East Devon District Council for a grant from their Culture Leisure and



The solar panels produce free energy from the sun, and store any surplus within the batteries for use at a later time. This saves considerable amounts of money and will make the venue more financially secure in the years to come. It also reduces the demand upon town taxpayers who support this important community building, which not only hosts some fantastic events, but provides a low cost venue for numerous community groups and charitable initiatives.

In addition, and perhaps more importantly, the system will dramatically lower the Guildhall's carbon footprint and save up to 5 tonnes of CO2 each year. We are now actively looking for additional grant funding to extend the project to upgrade the heating, and even cooling, of the building. This will further reduce our reliance on fossil fuels to regulate the temperature in the hall.

Message from the Mayor

Axminster Town Council held its Annual Parish Meeting on 4 March, earlier than usual so that we could explain the Budget and Precept Statement for the next financial year. There were fascinating presentations from EDDC and

the Environment Agency on flooding issues and emergency planning, both emphasising the need for community involvement.

We were sad to lose Sarah Birnie and Becky Lippett as Councillors but delighted to welcome Wayne Hurren and Jenny Bull. It's very affirming to have strong candidates for co-option. Being a Town Councillor can be quite hard work for a voluntary role, and it's great to have diverse views and opinions shared by people with very different backgrounds and life experiences.

There is much to be proud of in this town. May I take this opportunity to recommend **whatsinaxminster.co.uk**, a new web page aiming to showcase every business, community group and event in the town, for the benefit of locals and visitors.

There is also much to look forward to. Gate To Plate, for example, returns for its second year, this time on 27 May, closely followed by the "D-Day 80" Celebration on Minster Green on 8 June. As is tradition, the Raising of the Glove on 20 June marks the start of the week-long Cherry Fayre and the Axe Vale Show returns to the Axminster showground from 22 to 23 June.

I said at the Annual Parish Meeting that I was proud of the hard work of all Town Council staff. That's worth repeating to a wider audience here. They all go above and beyond what they are paid to do in support of town residents. And I repeat my thanks to those members of the public who attend Council meetings. Their support and comments are greatly valued.

Clerk's Corner - Your Council Tax Explained

Council Tax pays for all manner of essential public services, but how is it calculated, where does your money go, and how is it used each year?



All Councils in the UK are operating under a challenging set of budgetary rules, with increasing costs and a rising demand for services. In addition, the smaller local authorities (essentially, the town and parish councils) are having to provide services and facilities that used to be delivered by the higher tier authorities, such as East Devon District Council and Devon County Council, both of whom are facing even more severe budgetary constraints laid down by central government.

The Town Council is almost entirely reliant on what we refer to as the Council Tax "precept" – our small share of the overall Council Tax bill that every household receives around this time each year. The pie chart opposite shows the situation clearly. Of every £1 that you pay in Council Tax (whatever band your property falls into), just 6p is received by the Town Council to deliver all of the services

and amenities shown below, and many, many more.

The lion's share of the annual bill gets paid over to Devon County Council (71%) and then the Fire and Police Service collectively get just under 16%, with EDDC being allocated the remaining 7%. So, you can see that what the Town Council asks you for is a tiny part of your entire bill -6%.





For a typical Band D property, that 6% costs you forty-two pence per day (or the equivalent of half a four-finger KitKat) but 7 out of every 10 properties in the town are in Band C or below, and so they will pay less than this. Below are just some of the services and amenities Axminster Town Council provides for that 42p per day (depending on your property banding)

Unlike many other East Devon towns, Axminster Town Council owns several key heritage assets such as The Guildhall, the Old Courthouse Complex and the Town Cemetery and whilst these amenities add to the range of services we offer residents, they do come at a price, both in terms of their maintenance and their day-to-day operation & governance.

Ever changing legislation, risk management, licensing compliance and visitor safety regulations means that significant investment in these assets is inevitable and unavoidable. The Town Council has to take a long-term approach to such expenditure, looking ahead 5-10 years, but faces budgetary pressures, both inflationary and regulatory, here-and-now.

In the future, additional housing development in the town may come forward and this would reduce taxes for the existing residents by spreading the precept burden over a wider pool of taxpayers. But those new residents will also want first-class amenities and so the financial pressures upon this Council will remain constant; this is the challenge that Councillors face when deciding their budget each year.

The Axminster Neighbourhood Plan Consultation Update

We are making a Neighbourhood Plan to give us some say in the future development of Axminster and its surrounding villages. Without a plan, we have less influence over how the planning authority allocate housing growth and the accompanying infrastructure. The steering group writing the Neighbourhood Plan is made up of both residents and councillors.

The Plan has moved forward since the last update. Thanks go out to residents who completed the Draft Policies Consultation. We had around 140 responses which was less than our previous survey, but still gave useful feedback for us to be able to adjust the policies to more accurately reflect the concerns of residents.

We are now working on the final draft of the Plan,

and getting ready to send it to East Devon District Council for their feedback before we are ready to submit it for assessment.

Hearing our concerns about flooding

Following the recent extreme rainfall, some residents contacted the Council about the impact flooding in the area has had on them. The Council invited Chris Khan from the Environment Agency to come and present to the public about flooding in the River Axe catchment area at the Annual Parish Meeting. David Whelan from EDDC also attended to talk about how communities can develop an emergency plan.

Emergency plans are owned by the community, rather than by the Council, but the Town Council has initiated the process for developing a plan and would like to invite residents, particularly those frequently affected by flooding, to get involved. Please contact us if you would like to participate.

We look after around 38km of public rights of way, bridlepaths and cycle ways in collaboration with Devon County Council and help from a great many land-owners across the parish.

We do all we can to keep the routes traversable, prioritising the most travelled routes, but we cannot be everywhere at once, so we are grateful to those of you who highlight when a footpath needs attention. A warmer welcome to train travellers

In the past, the area next to the train station was cared for by some enthusiastic volunteers. Unfortunately, at some point, despite their best efforts, caring for this site become too much and it had become overgrown with brambles. That had a negative impact on biodiversity but also resulted in an increase of antisocial behaviour.

This area is the first thing visitors see when arriving in Axminster by train or bus and, for many years, the Council has had ambitions to improve this small wedge of land. This Spring, we have undertaken some works including the removal of some (not all) of the bramble as well as some dead and diseased Cherry trees which had become a risk to passers-by. We will improve the site in the future with new amenities, planting to encourage richer biodiversity, reducing antisocial behaviour and creating a warm welcome to those arriving by public transport.
